Course Guide for Students

A Guide for Exploring Selected Areas of Law

2011-2012

Although students seeking a J.D. degree are not expected to specialize, some students may want to know which advanced courses they should take to explore certain areas of the law. This guide is intended to help students pursue particular interests. Naturally, people have differing views on which courses are most important in a given area. Students desiring additional information are urged to consult with the professors who teach courses in their areas of interest, as well as with the Student Affairs Office.

**This requirement applies to students who have not completed LARC III before the commencement of the fall semester, 2010.*

Students must also satisfy the following requirements:

1. Students matriculating in the fall of 2009 and earlier must enroll and complete LARC III in their second year.
2. Students matriculating in the fall of 2010 and later must, after completing all basic required courses, enroll in and complete one of the following skills courses:
 - Litigation Drafting, or
 - Contract Drafting, or
 - Lawyering Practice, or
 - Appellate Clinic, or
 - Civil Practice Clinic, or
 - Criminal Defense Clinic, or
 - Disability Clinic, or

- Wrongful Conviction Clinic, or
- Advanced Legal Research, or
- Advanced Persuasive Writing and Oral Advocacy, or
- Interviewing and Counseling, or
- Public Policy Mediation within State Government, or
- Trial Practice

Students are required to complete 90 credits hours to graduate. In addition to the courses listed above, all students must complete an advanced research and writing requirement. This requirement may be satisfied through a paper written for Supervised Research, a paper written in a course or seminar, or a paper written for one of the School's three law reviews.

Additional graduation requirements include:

- (1) A cumulative grade point average of at least 2.3 on a 4.0 scale
- (2) Completion of the equivalent of six semesters of full-time resident study or eight semesters of part-time resident study
- (3) Completion of all degree requirements within 84 months of matriculation

Indiana Bar Admission

Admission and Discipline Rule 17 of the Indiana Supreme Court requires applicants for admission to the Indiana bar to pass two separate examinations: (1) The Multistate Professional Responsibility Examination (MPRE) and (2) the Indiana Bar Examination. Applications for these examinations are available in the Law School Recorder's Office.

Multistate Professional Responsibility Examination

The MPRE is given three times a year. The Professional Responsibility course, which is required for graduation, covers issues of professional responsibility and legal ethics. Rule 17 provides that an applicant must achieve a passing score on the MPRE taken "within two years before or after the date the applicant successfully takes" the Indiana Bar Examination. Applicants must pass both examinations must be passed before admission to the bar.

Indiana Bar Examination

The Indiana Bar Examination is given in February and July. Admission and Discipline Rule 13 of the Indiana Supreme Court requires applicants to complete at least two credit hours of law school course work in professional responsibility. Applicants are not required to take courses in other discrete subjects. The examination consists of three parts:

- The Multistate Performance Test (MPT), a written three-hour examination consisting of two 90-minute tasks that examine the following fundamental lawyering skills: problem solving, legal analysis and reasoning, factual analysis, communications, organization and management of a legal task, and recognizing and resolving ethical dilemmas.
- The Indiana Essay Exam (IEE), a written four-hour examination consisting of six essay questions. The subjects tested will come from the following nine areas (which the MBE does not cover): Administrative Law, Business Organizations, Commercial Law, Indiana Constitutional Law, Family Law, Pleading and Practice, Personal Property, Taxation and Wills, Trusts and Estates. The essay questions will be unlabeled, will not necessarily be limited to one subject matter, and will call for an answer based on the Indiana Law.
- The Multistate Bar Examination (MBE), an objective one-day examination consisting of 200 multiple-choice questions in the following areas: Constitutional Law, Contracts, Criminal Law, Evidence, Real Property, and Torts.

The three tests are weighted as follows: MPT 20%, IEE 30%, MBE 50%.

Bar Examinations in Other States

Students who intend to take the bar examination in another state should familiarize themselves early in law school with the requirements and procedures for admission to the bar of that state. Additional information and a directory of state bar admission administrators are available in the Office of Professional Development.

Recall that all students must successfully complete the Professional Responsibility course and satisfy the advanced research and writing requirement following their first year.

Recommended and Elective Courses

Successful practice of law and legal problem-solving require an attorney to have knowledge of a variety of areas of the law and other disciplines, regardless of the the nature of the attorney's practice. In addition, preparation for a career in law should acknowledge that the practice will continually require a lawyer to respond to novel problems, emerging social and cultural issues, and new developments in the law itself. To prepare graduates to meet these challenges, the law school highly recommends that every J.D. student take the upper-division electives listed below. Each of these courses covers topics on the Indiana Bar Examination.

These courses provide an introductory overview of foundational legal knowledge that is not covered in required J.D. courses. Given these courses' foundational nature, the law school is committed to offering each of them at least twice a year, once in the day and once in the evening.

To broaden and deepen the basic legal knowledge that students acquire in the required J.D. courses, the law school recommends that every law student take at least one elective in each of the following six categories of upper-division courses. Courses on this list that cover topics on the Indiana Bar Examination are designated with an asterisk (*). The listed courses are suggestive and not exclusive. Other courses may be offered from time to time falling within one or more of these categories:

- **Commercial Law:** Secured Transactions* *or* Commercial Paper.*
- **Constitutional Law:** Civil Rights *or* Federal Courts *or* First Amendment *or* Law of

Church and State Relations *or* State Constitutional Law* *or* Rights of Noncitizens *or* Seminar on Constitutional Law *or* Seminar in Church and State Relations *or* Popular Constitutional Change.

- **Property Law:** Housing Discrimination & Segregation *or* Land Use *or* Natural Resources Law *or* Real Estate Transfer, Finance and Development *or* Seminar in Business and Estate Planning *or* Water Law.
- **Torts Law:** Advanced Torts *or* Environmental & Toxic Torts *or* Law of Medical Malpractice *or* Products Liability *or* Seminar in Selected Problems of Tort Law.
- **Federal Statutory Law:** Antitrust *or* Bankruptcy *or* Consumer Law *or* Copyright *or* Corporate Reorganization & Bankruptcy *or* Discrimination in Employment *or* Environmental Law *or* ERISA Retirement Plans *or* Food and Drug Law *or* Immigration Law *or* Intellectual Property *or* Labor Arbitration/Collective Bargaining *or* Labor Law *or* Law of Hazardous Waste Regulation *or* Legislation *or* Patent Law *or* Securities Regulation *or* Sexual Harassment Law *or* Trademark Law.
- **Perspectives on the Law:** A perspectives course is one that approaches the law and legal institutions from a special perspective. Such a perspective might be an international and/or comparative law approach to a certain subject area, or an interdisciplinary approach to the law, such as Law and Economics.

The law school offers a variety of the electives in each of these categories each year, giving every student several options in each category over the course of the student's tenure at the law school. The law school generally will offer each particular elective once per year, alternating years between the day and night divisions.

Students seeking additional preparation for the Indiana Bar Examination might consider also taking one or more of the following courses:

- Criminal Procedure: Adjudication
- Publicly Traded Corporations
- Juvenile Law
- State and Local Taxation *or* Taxation of Corporations and Shareholders *or* Taxation of Partnerships and Partners *or* Taxation of Transferors, Fiduciaries, and Beneficiaries

The law school generally offers each of these courses once a year, alternating years between the day and night divisions. Students planning to take the bar exam in another state should consult the bar examiners in that state for the list of topics covered.

In the following tables, elective courses including externships offered for credit are grouped by subject matter. Teachers of those courses are also listed. If no teacher is listed, the course is typically taught by adjunct or visiting faculty. Students should bear in mind that additional courses not listed under a particular subject area may be helpful if they intend to practice in a given area and that additional courses may be offered from time to time in each subject matter. Except for courses that have prerequisites, no attempt has been made to suggest the order in which courses should be taken. Students desiring additional information about course sequencing or the courses to take to achieve a particular objective should consult with the professors teaching courses in their areas of interest or the Student Affairs Office. Also, please be aware that the school cannot always offer each course in this guide.

Concentration in Environmental and Natural Resources Law

Students wishing to undertake a course of studies in Environmental and Natural Resources (ENR) Law and related areas may pursue a Concentration in Environmental and Natural Resources Law. The ENR Concentration is designed for students preparing to become environmental or natural resource lawyers or leaders. The course of study will also benefit students whose future work concerns property law, real estate development or transactions, corporate acquisitions, land use, energy policy or regulation, urban planning, transportation, agriculture, public health, and/or occupational safety, as well as those students interested more generally in public policy, public interest advocacy, or government at the state, local, national, or international level.

ENR Concentration Requirements

A Concentration in Environmental and Natural Resource Law will be awarded to enrolled JD candidates who complete at least 6 approved courses totaling at least 15 credit hours in Environmental and Natural Resource Law and closely-related subjects while maintaining a 3.2 cumulative GPA in all required core and upper level courses applied toward the Concentration and a 3.0 GPA overall. The 6 approved courses include three required core courses (Environmental Law; Natural Resources Law; Administrative Law), at least two upper level courses from the list below, and one capstone writing, practical, or skills course.

Other courses may occasionally be offered that have been approved for concentration credit. A list of concentration approved courses that will be offered in a particular semester will be distributed during the prior semester, before registration for the semester in which the courses will be offered. No other courses will count toward the concentration, except that a student desiring concentration credit on an individual basis for a course that has not been approved for concentration credit may file a petition with the Executive Director of the Hall Center for Law and Health within a reasonable time before the beginning of the semester in which the course is to be taken. Such a petition may only be granted by a Director of the Hall Center for Law and Health, who shall be a member of the voting faculty, or, if no such Director exists, by the Academic Affairs Committee.

Concentration in Advocacy Skills

Students may pursue a Concentration in Advocacy Skills by satisfying the curricular requirements outlined in this section. The concentration would follow one of two tracks: the Civil Practice Track or the Criminal Practice Track. The curriculum for the concentration consists of three required core classes shared by both tracks, a variety of advanced courses common to both tracks, and advanced elective courses specific to each track. A student would complete a minimum of 24 hours to achieve the Advocacy Skills Concentration.

Students must receive a “satisfactory” completion of any clinical course requirement in the concentration. They also must complete the concentration with at least a 3.0 cumulative GPA in all of the graded courses in the concentration and must attain a grade of B- in each course counted toward the concentration. A student who receives a grade below B- in one of the elective courses cannot count that elective toward the concentration requirements, but may enroll in an additional course from the list of elective courses within the concentration to satisfy the requirement.

Students wishing to pursue the concentration must register their intent with the Recorder. For students who complete the Concentration in Advocacy Skills, documentation of the concentration will be included on their official law school transcript.
